

Tell the students: "Now that we know a little more about our military and the armed forces, let's look at why we honor our serviceman and women every November 11 th . Using the information provided in the following two short videos, fill in your answers to the questions on your "Poppy Cut Out". Once you complete your answers, you can start coloring and cutting out your red poppy."	Hand out the "Veteran's Day Poppy Cut Out" to each student. Students will need access to red markers, colored pencils, and/or crayons and scissors for this portion of the lesson.	
Show the following video clip "Veterans Day - How it started and why we honor it - KID HISTORY" (2.10 min): <u>https://youtu.be/CP40EFzPR5c</u> Then, show video clip "Bet You Didn't Know: Veterans Day History" (2.12 min): <u>https://youtu.be/mWD4Oy6fKlo</u>	Have the student watch the video clip and fill in their graphic answers as they watch.	
Review the answer to the questions on the graphic with the class. Challenge students to give their red poppy flower to someone who may not know the history / importance behind Veteran's Day.	 Once they watched both videos, they can start: 1. Coloring the backside of the half-circles (areas with the questions on them) red. 2. Fold the half circles over to create petals. 3. Once all are colored and folded, students should have created a red poppy flower to honor veterans.

Tell the class, "As we reflect upon Taya's story of honor, resilience, humility, and leadership, it's time for us to identify a veteran that houses these same qualities." Resource Links for Students:	Step 1 - Ask students to research an individual who has served in the U.S. Armed Forces. You can selected a U.S. veteran from any time period and any military branch. Remember, they can be men, women, or an animal.

The vision board needs to depict the following information: Who is the individual you chose to research? Give a brief explanation of their life, family, career, etc. Give a brief explanation of the role your veteran played in the military. Describe how your individual lived up to the motto "Do What You Can While You Can"? Provide a brief explanation of why you chose the individual. Demonstrate your attitude of gratitude by explaining why you are grateful for their service. Include three to five photos of the individual.

 - **Answer:** On December 20th, 2019, the U.S. Space Force was established when the National Defense Authorization Act was signed into law (with bi-partisan support), creating the first new branch of the armed services in 73 years.
 - The U.S. Space Force organizes, trains, and equips space forces in order to protect the U.S. and allied interests in space and to provide space capabilities to the joint force.
